

*Tullujuto, Cordillera Central.* The Scot Frank Hepburn, German Erich Pahl, New Zealander Jennifer Davidson and I drove to Azulcocha. Several days of bad weather prevented setting up a high camp until October 3. From there we climbed Tullujuto (18,886 feet) via its north glacier and northeast ridge. Further climbing was curtailed when Hepburn injured his leg in a Base Camp wrestling match.

*P 5370, Tunshu Group, Cordillera Central.* Two friends, Ruedi Merker and Magdalena Hohl, and I drove from Lima to Azulcocha on August 30. On September 2 we climbed Tatatunshu (17,241 feet) on easy, hard snow. In the afternoon the weather turned bad and remained bad for the rest of our stay. On September 5 we ascended Tatajaico (16,634 feet). On September 9 we made the first ascent of P 5370 (17,618 feet), the summit between Pacca I and Pachancota, first easy rock and then snow. We ascended from the east.

*Cordillera Yauyos.* In late September, 1971 Frank Hepburn, Scot, Peter Radcliffe and I, New Zealanders, were blessed by a week's fine weather in the Yauyos. After the Huancayo-Yauyos bus at Tinku, we went up the side valley to Miraflores and then up the valley between Cotoní and Pariaccaca to camp near the head. We all climbed Pariaccaca (called Padreccaca on the *Hoja Yauyos* of the IGM, but Pariaccaca according to all the locals). From a camp farther west Frank and Peter climbed Cotoní, apparently the highest peak in the area and marked 5800 meters (19,029 feet) on the map. They crossed the col between Cotoní and the peak to the north, traversed the glacier northwest of the peak and climbed the west ridge.

## Southern Peru

*Cordillera Chila, Ampato, Hualca Hualca.* A German expedition from Augsburg first visited the Cordillera Chila, which lies south of Chivay and north of Calloma. Expedition members were Engelbert Neumair, leader; Walter and Petra Siebert, Hubert Abele, Franz Leutgäb, Alfred Matt, Gerhard Patz, Helmut Steinherr and Hermann Warth. After considerable delays in getting baggage through customs, on May 19 they finally approached the range through Calloma and Chiayulla. Base Camp was set up on May 21 at 15,250 feet. They climbed nearly all of the peaks of the range. Minaspatá ( $15^{\circ}26' S$ ,  $71^{\circ}52' W$ ) was the peak the farthest west which they climbed. This group lies in a semi-circle which
