CLIMBS AND EXPEDITIONS

The couloir between Camps I and II was threatened by avalanches. It took three days from Camp IV to prepare the route to within 600 feet of the summit. This was throughout a technical climb, involving stepcutting, aluminium stakes and fixed rope on hard, glistening blue ice. The summit proper (22,650 feet) was a three-fanged cornice toward the east, which shook under the weight of the 18 climbers who reached it more or less simultaneously on five different ropes at 12:35 on May 26. Nandapal. This difficult virgin 20,690-foot peak, east of Tirsuli, was climbed by an Indo-Tibetan Border Police team on June 8 despite unfavorable weather. Deputy Leader Ramesh Chandra was one of the ten who reached the summit.

Balakun. This virgin peak of 21,430 feet northeast of Nilkanta was climbed on July 9 by a six-man team from the Indo-Tibetan Border Police led by Hukam Singh.

Chaudhara. Indians led by Professor A.R. Chandekar attempted Rajrambha and on June 2_made the first ascent of Chaudhara (21,364 feet), northwest of Panchchuli. After ascending the Ralam River, they made Base Camp on the Shiva Glacier at 13,800 feet. Camps I and II were at 15,100 and 17,700 feet. From Camp II on June 1 they attempted Rajrambha but they were turned back by technical difficulties. Nayan Katira, Subhas Desai and Sherpas Ajiba and Kami climbed Chaudhara the next day.

Uja Tirche. This 20,344-foot peak was climbed by the Indians Bidijut Sarkar, K.K. Khannna and Manik Banerjee and Sherpas Kani and Kusang on October 15. After climbing a gendarmed ridge, they reached a rocky saddle some 150 feet lower than the summit. This final summit ridge was particularly difficult. Shyamal Chacraborty was the leader. The peak was climbed by Scots in 1950.

Vasuki Peak. Vasuki Peak (22,285 feet) is above the Vasuki Glacier, which feeds the Chaturangi Glacier. It was climbed on October 2 by Tej Singh, Ang Puri and Nima Futar of the Indo-Tibetan Border Police. The expedition was led by L.P. Semwel.
