Peaks in the Tos Glacier System. Our expedition climbed ten peaks between 18,000 and 21,150 feet, including three first ascents. We made the following climbs: Prow (18,230 feet) first ascent, via north side by Nicolas Groves solo on May 9 and 10; Shudra Par (c. 18,000 feet; on the ridge between Asti Par and Nalgil) first ascent, via south ridge by Groves, Michael Searle on May 13; Tara Par (19,456 feet) via west ridge by Groves on May 14; Deception Peak (19,750 feet; also called Bipseer Par) via northwest face by Groves, Searle, who then continued on over Angdu Ri (19,450 feet); Deception Peak also on May 22 via east ridge and descent via northwest face by Peter Thexton, Bernard Ingram; Dharamsura or White Sail (21,148 feet) via south ridge by Groves, Searle on May 23; Sentinel Peak (c. 18,500 feet) first ascent via southwest face above the pass from the Tos to the Chota Shigri Glacier on perfect granite with pitches of UIAA V and VI by Groves, Thexton from June 3 to 6; Morning Peak (17,600 feet) by Ingram on June 4; Roberts Peak (19,243 feet) by Ingram on June 5; and Devachan (20,300 feet) second ascent via new route, the northwest face.

NICHOLAS GROVES, England

Dharamsura. An Indian ladies' expedition climbed Dharamsura (21,-165 feet) on October 3. Roma Sen Gupta, leader, Bani Bose, Maitreyee Mitra, Chhanda Bhattacherjee, Rachana Das, Sati Patra, two Sherpas: Nawang Tsering and Karma, and three high-altitude porters: Nil Chand, Lal Chand and Daulat Ram, reached the summit of this second highest peak in the Parbati valley. They had three camps on the mountain.

Robal Kang, Kulu. A seven-member team from Calcutta made the second ascent of Robal Kang (20,300 feet) on September 20. They were led by Asit Moitra.

Ali Ratni Tibba. This very difficult peak (18,013 feet) at the head of the Malana Nala was climbed early in August by an Indian team consisting of Ravi A. Kamath, Jayant Khadalia, Jamshed Homiar, Dr. Suresh Agrawal and Pasang Namgyal.

Gangstan, 1977. Shigeo Suzuki led a four-man Japanese expedition which climbed Gangstan (20,215 feet). From Manali they traveled for three days up the Billing Nala to Base Camp at 13,775 feet. Advanced Base was established on September 16 at the tongue of the Gangstan Glacier. Camp I was at 17,400 feet on the glacier and Camp II, established on September 22, was at 18,375 feet. All four reached the summit on September 26, 1977.
