ing it a grade of VI+ with ice sections up to 95°. (*High Mountain Sports* July 1995.)

Cerro Torre Valley, Various Ascents. In January, during a four-week stay in Bridwell Camp and thanks to the cooperation of the weather, I managed to accomplish with various partners several interesting ascents. On January 10, Conrad Anker, Steve Gerberding, and I climbed Cerro Stanhardt by the route *Exocet*. We took nine hours from the snow cave at the base of Cerro Torre's East Face to the summit. On January 18 Adrian Da Coincercao and I climbed the Voie des Benitiers on Cerro el Mocho, an excellent 12-pitch rock climb that goes mostly free. On January 24, Charlie Fowler and I climbed the Kearney Route on the West Face of Aguja Saint Exupery (700 meters, 5.10+). The next day, thanks to the continuing good weather, we went on to ascend Aguja Innominata by the 1974 British Route (450 meters, 5.10+/A0). After one rest day, on January 27, we climbed the Carrington-Rouse Route on the West Face of Aguja Poincenot (1000 meters, 5.10). It took us six and one-half hours to climb this line. We descended the Patagonicos Desperados route on the East Face and arrived in Rio Blanco just in time for some asado. On February 2, I went on to climb the East Ridge of Cerro Grande (600 meters,  $60^{\circ}$ ).

Cerro Adela Sur, New Route, and Traverse of Cerro Nato, Doblado, and Grande. It was reported that the German Robert Jasper soloed a new 1000-meter mixed route in 20 hours, giving it a grade of IV and 90°. Beginning in the early evening, he reached the summit shortly before midnight, then continued to traverse south over the summits of Cerro Nato, Doblado and Grande before returning to basecamp. (High Mountain Sports July 1995.)

Aguja de la S. This formation, although the smallest granite peak in the Fitz Roy area, offers superb climbing on both its eastern 1,500-foot face and its western 3,000-foot face. While it is believed there have been only a handful of ascents of this peak, several more were made this season. On December 19, the Anglo-American team of Julian Fisher, Charlie French and Cam Burns climbed a 1000-foot variation to the Italian *Red Dihedral* on the east face, grading it III 5.7.

Aguja Poincenot, South Face. It was reported that a four-man team of Andy Maag (Ireland), Makoto Ishibe (Japan), Alexandre Portela (Brazil) and Michel Shcwitter (Switzerland) climbed an 850-meter line up the South
