Starting with the latter, our Annual Outings to the Adirondacks draw sell-out crowds each and every January and June. "Bo" Parfet, one of the many younger followers of Dick's historic accomplishment, completed the line-up. We also feted another significant birthday, that of Vic Benes, who had recently celebrated his 80th atop Forbidden Peak in the Cascades with partner Ron Bixby. At the other end of the age spectrum was guest Jordan Romero, who at 17 has only Vinson to climb to become the youngest Seven Summiteer of all time. Among the many attendees were seven successful Seven Summiteers from the Section who were presented with special plaques marking their achievement as well as Charles Irion, the author of the Seven Summits Murder Mystery Series.
